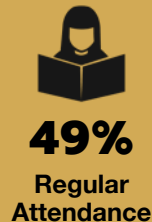
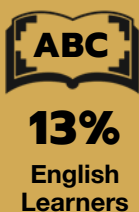
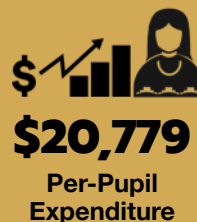

Learning in Context

Situated along the I-40 corridor, Grants-Cibola County Schools serves students from the city of Grants, the neighboring Acoma Pueblo and Laguna Pueblo, and other surrounding communities across Cibola County. By the time students arrive at school, many have already commuted across villages and towns, crossing the same roads that connect families, work, and community. At school, these different paths come together, and students share classrooms, meals, and perspectives with each other. By late afternoon, the same roads that brought students together carry them back toward Grants, nearby Pueblos, and smaller communities across the country.

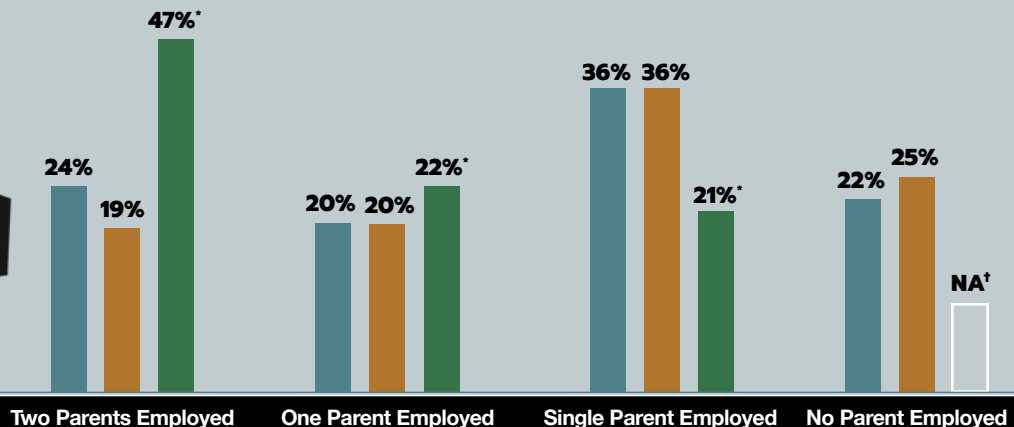

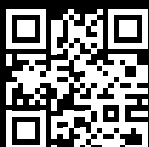
